Virginia School Boards Association Hosts Screening of Documentary: The Right to Read

Charlottesville, VA – This evening marked a pivotal occasion as the Virginia School Boards Association (VSBA) hosted an exclusive screening of the documentary, *The Right to Read*. This carefully curated event brought together a diverse audience comprising school board members, superintendents, legislators, educators, and community leaders, united by a shared commitment to the vital topic of literacy.

Rodney Jordan, Chair of the VSBA Task Force on Students and Schools in Challenging Environments, expressed enthusiasm about the event's success, stating, "The positive response to the screening of *The Right to Read* exceeded our expectations. The turnout and engagement showcased a collective dedication to prioritizing literacy education and to a renewed commitment by school boards to govern continuous improvement systems that are student outcomes focused on driving reading excellence for each student."

The event left many inspired, ready to take proactive measures in their communities and advocate for policies that place literacy education at the forefront.
