# April 2026 – VSBA Workforce Readiness

Dear School Board Members/Superintendents:

To emphasize the importance of workforce readiness opportunities that prepare students for success in today's economy, the Virginia School Boards Association (VSBA) has designated April as **VSBA Workforce Readiness Month**, with **April 16, 2026, recognized as Workforce Readiness Day in Virginia**.

The VSBA Task Force on Workforce Readiness was established by the VSBA Board of Directors in 2015 to study how career and technical education programs are being implemented in Virginia school divisions and how these programs are preparing the state's future workforce.

The Task Force has been vital in providing local school boards with best practices for developing and expanding Career & Technical Education (CTE) as well as workforce readiness programs that offer training on skill sets that will allow students to be globally competitive. It is also critical to collaborate with the businesses and community colleges to ensure that students have early access and the opportunity to participate in workforce readiness programs. In September of 2024 the VSBA Task Force was moved to be a subcommittee of the Task Force on Students and Schools in Challenging Environments where it continues to function today.

VSBA will promote Workforce Readiness Month through our newsletter, website, and social media. We encourage school divisions to issue their own news releases and share any related activities with VSBA.

Suggested activities include:

- **Adopt a proclamation** – a sample proclamation that your board can use is enclosed.
- **Engage local media** by writing a letter to the editor or inviting reporters to cover workforce readiness or CTE initiatives in your division.
- **Host an event** on Workforce Readiness Day (April 16, 2026).
- **Highlight work-based learning opportunities** (internships, apprenticeships, job-shadowing, etc.) for students and recognize local businesses and organizations that provide them.
- **Organize student contests** (poster, video, writing, etc.) highlighting the importance of workforce readiness throughout the month.
- **Showcase CTE and workforce readiness programs** on your division's website and social media throughout the month.
- **Recognize CTE educators and business partners** at a school board meeting in April.
- **Conduct workforce readiness workshops** in partnership with businesses and community colleges to highlight existing programs.

This guide includes a variety of resources to support these efforts, including the Task Force's key initiatives, a sample proclamation, a sample news release, a sample letter to the editor, and sample social media posts.

Workforce readiness efforts across Virginia are *Rooted in Public Education*, recognizing that strong communities begin with strong schools. By supporting educators and investing in programs that build real-world skills, industry partnerships, and career pathways, public education is preparing students to thrive in the future.

Divisions are encouraged to showcase their workforce and career readiness programs, including expanding workforce and technology pathways. # Key Goals & Findings

In 2026, the Workforce Readiness Committee is focusing on the following key initiatives:

- **Industry Partnership for Career-Readiness Programs:** A resource helping school divisions establish and maintain partnerships with local businesses, creating internship, job shadowing, and mentorship opportunities that support both literacy development and career readiness.
- **Workplace Literacy & Career Skills Assessment Tool:** Evidence-based instruments and best practices to measure students career readiness skills, enabling schools to evaluate how effectively they prepare students for workforce success.
- **Career Mentorship with Literacy Focus:** Best practice strategies connecting students with industry professionals, emphasizing the critical link between strong literacy skills and career success while providing meaningful career exploration opportunities.
- **Virginia Workforce Pathways: High-Demand Jobs Without a Bachelor's Degree:** Research identifying high-demand jobs in Virginia offering strong career prospects, competitive wages, and long-term growth opportunities. Analysis includes skilled trades, healthcare, technology, and manufacturing sectors, with comprehensive data on job requirements, median salaries, needed skills, and educational alternatives.

**The previous work of the Task Force included:**

In Fall 2015, the Task Force conducted a statewide survey of public school divisions to gather information on CTE across the Commonwealth. From this survey, the following five goals were developed for the Task Force:

- Funding Innovation and Workforce Development (Pre-K–12)
- Addressing the CTE teacher shortage
- Survey Superintendents
- Identifying and promoting replication of best practices in the Commonwealth
- Promoting career education and workforce development

On January 18, 2016, the Task Force findings were presented to the House Education Committee:

- Increased funding is needed to sustain current programs, develop new programs, update equipment and resources, and obtain the highest quality instructors.
- There is a need for greater collaboration between business/industry leaders and CTE.
- The ability to employ the most qualified personnel for CTE instruction is an ongoing issue.
- Increased collaboration with business and industry, the community college system, and the core school setting is necessary.
- The impact of scheduling, graduation requirements, and Standards of Learning (SOL) demands significantly affect a student's availability to be enrolled in CTE programs.
- Virtual learning and distance learning options should be explored in order to expand workforce training opportunities throughout the Commonwealth.
- The need for earlier introduction of career education and other options is necessary for both students and families.
- Enhance the integration of essential employment skills or soft skills and ethics throughout our K-12 classrooms.

To address the urgency of filling these positions, both college and career readiness must be central to the mission of our K-12 schools. The demand for highly skilled jobs over the next decade in Virginia will continue to increase. These jobs can be filled by qualified public school students.

**WHEREAS**, work-based learning opportunities, such as internships, apprenticeships, mentorships, and project-based experiences, give students practical skills and insights while helping employers build a strong talent pipeline; and

**WHEREAS**, we recognize increased collaboration with business and industry, the community college system, and the core school setting is necessary; and

**WHEREAS**, the promise of public education is for every child to be successful in school and life; and

**WHEREAS**, it is important for Virginia families, students, teachers, and school administrators to be actively engaged in supporting the importance of workforce readiness as part of the educational experience; and;

**WHEREAS**, we recognize that limited funding, resources, facilities, partnerships, and qualified Career & Technical Education staff impedes student access to workforce readiness opportunities; and

**WHEREAS**, Workforce Readiness Month provides an opportunity to celebrate and recognize the work of our local school division and divisions across the Commonwealth providing workforce development pathways for students; and

Now, **THEREFORE**, be it Resolved, the \_\_\_\_\_ division joins the Virginia School Boards Association in recognizing the month of April 2026 as Workforce Readiness Month and April 16, 2026, as Workforce Readiness Day, with the intention to advocate and increase awareness about the supports necessary to promote workforce development opportunities that enable students to be prepared to succeed in a global economy.
